Halfway through 2019, we're pleased to report that we've got a lot going on, not the least of which is the **opening of two fabulous cafés** – one in our **PwC building** and the other at **Princes Court**!

Not only will these new gathering spots be convenient places for tenants and their visitors to grab healthy breakfasts, lunches or pick-me-up snacks, they're also great for impromptu meetings over a cup of coffee. Over the past few months, Princes Court has also been a temporary home for students and teachers of Holy Name Convent. The school suffered serious damage in the wake of the August 21, 2018 earthquake, to the point where it compromised the structural integrity of key buildings, making them unsafe. We'll share the story of how RGM got involved and where the school is at in its recovery process.

With our new flagship property, Savannah East, being the first ever LEED-certified building in Trinidad and Tobago, we're interested in all things related to green construction. New research from the U.S. Green Building Council suggests that the general public is largely unaware of the role that green buildings can play in mitigating the climate crisis – and since island nations like ours will be the most at risk if the situation worsens, we'd like to share some of the report's findings and offer you concrete ways in which you can help to reduce the negative effects of global heating.

A Safe Space for Students

AUGUST 21, 2018 IS NOT A DAY THAT ANYONE IN TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO WILL SOON FORGET. AN EARTHQUAKE, 7.3 IN MAGNITUDE AT ITS EPICENTRE IN NORTHERN VENEZUELA, WAS 6.9 BY THE TIME ITS RIPPLE EFFECTS REACHED TRINIDAD.

Miraculously, there was no loss of life resulting from the tremor, but the violent shaking, which lasted for a minute and a half, caused damage to some buildings in and around Port of Spain, Holy Name Convent included.

The school experienced structural damage to some staircases and various parts of the roof, making some areas unsafe to occupy. Students found themselves suddenly displaced from their classrooms, and the school's administration now had to figure out how best to create a comfortable learning environment under such space constraints.



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Holy Name Convent immediately sought financial assistance from the Ministry of Education so that it could attend to the most pressing repairs. When the new school year began in September 2018, pupils found themselves crammed into hallways for lessons; the school's chapel often doubled as a classroom. It was less than ideal.

Although the Ministry of Education agreed to begin the repairs by December, the strain on both staff and students had reached its peak a month earlier. The school held an open meeting with the parent body to update them on progress, present the proposed schedule of repair works and address the frustration that everyone was understandably feeling about the inconvenience.

It was clear that the repairs would take some time, so even as the principal prepared stakeholders for an extended period of disruption, she also appealed to them to offer alternative solutions to comfortably accommodate classes in the interim.

That's where RGM stepped in. Princes Court, one of the city's premier corporate office locations, sits a couple of blocks away from the school – and it happened to have temorarily vacant space on the fifth floor. It was air conditioned, well lit and most of all, safe and secure, with top-level HSSE systems in place. We were happy to offer it as a temporary location for classes and the school was pleased to accept.

We made Princes Court available to Holy Name Convent's entire Form VI cohort from the beginning of the second term, in January



2019. While repairs at the school were underway, the classes moved in with desks, chairs and whiteboards. Following the initial phase of the school repairs, the students eventually moved back to their regular quarters on April 6, 2019. Other repairs to the school are ongoing but progressing well, and should be completed during the July/August vacation.

It was a wonderful experience for us as a landlord and the building's corporate tenants were fully supportive of the initiative.

We were genuinely happy to have put our A-class commercial office space to good use by creating an environment in which the leaders of the future can work towards achieving their own A grades!



Changing The Narrative of Green Buildings

ONE OF THE MOST RESPECTED INTERNATIONAL NEWS ORGANISATIONS, THE UK GUARDIAN, RECENTLY UPDATED ITS EDITORIAL GUIDELINES BY INTRODUCING TERMS IT FELT MORE ACCURATELY DESCRIBE THE REALITY OF THE WORLD'S ENVIRONMENTAL CRISIS.

While commonly used phrases like "climate change" and "global warming" are not prohibited, the Guardian now prefers to use words like **"climate crisis"**, **"emergency" or "breakdown", and "global heating"** to describe the pressing environmental situation.

The Guardian's editor-in-chief, Katharine Viner, explained that the paper wanted to be "scientifically precise, while also communicating clearly [on this very important issue." Interestingly, a new study by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) also underscores the importance of clear communication around sensitive environmental issues.

Titled "Standard Issue", the April 2019 USGBC report revealed that the general public is uninformed when it comes to understanding how green buildings can help mitigate this impending environmental catastrophe. While most people acknowledge the urgency of environmental concerns, most have not changed their daily habits to benefit the environment and green buildings were not high on their radar when it came to planet-saving measures.

According to USGBC President Mahesh Ramanujam, this all points to the fact that the green building movement has "a messaging mountain to climb" in order to inspire behavioural change on a larger scale and promote the message that our planet is in clear and present danger. The best way in which to do this, they've found, is to base the messaging on a platform of good health. If you start the conversation from a place of promoting well being, it's easier to connect the dots so that people can see the specific ways in which green buildings benefit them and by extension, the wider community. Those who work in green buildings can attest to experiencing the effects themselves: tenants of Savannah East, Trinidad and Tobago's first LEED-certified building, have noted how sustanability can seamlessly co-exist with a contemporary design and luxurious finishes, all while beign in harmony with nature and not harming the environment.

Global accounting giant KPMG, which has its local offices at Savannah East, said, "In addition to the obvious environmental benefits of a green building, the improvement in quality of life and occupant health and comfort takes precedence for us.
